OUR FAITH

Jesus' passion was excruciating, but it ended not in death but life. While he was enduring his passion, it was struggle, rejection, pain, and death. But because Jesus endured to the end, he was transformed into glory in the resurrection. As members of the body of Christ, our passion will also end in glory with Christ.



POPE FRANCIS SPEAKS TO OUR HEARTS

Why the Cross? Because Jesus takes upon himself the evil, the filth, the sin of the world, including the sin of all of us, and he cleanses it: he cleanses it with his blood, with the mercy and the love of God. Let us look around: how many wounds are inflicted upon humanity by evil! Wars, violence, economic conflicts that hit the weakest; greed for money that you can't take with you and have to leave. When we were small, our grandmother used to say, "A shroud has no pocket." Love of power, corruption, divisions, crimes against human life and against creation! And—as each one of us knows and is aware—our personal sins: our failures in love and respect toward God, toward our neighbor, and toward the whole of creation. Jesus on the Cross feels the whole weight of the evil, and with the force of God's love he conquers it; he defeats it with his resurrection This is the good that Jesus does for us on the throne of the cross. Christ's cross embraced with love never leads to sadness but to joy, to the joy of having been saved and of doing a little of what he did on the day of his death.
